AkiDwA is honoured with Rosie Hackett Award

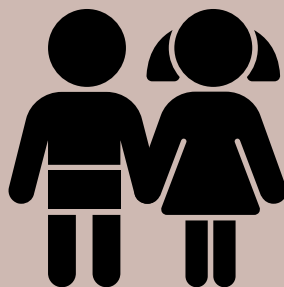

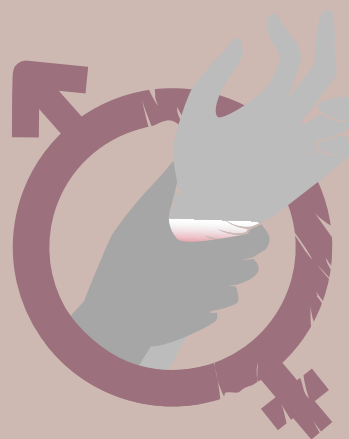
And a second meeting was held with chief superintendent for the youth to discuss concrete actions on work with migrant youth.



Minister Launches Victim Support project

AkiDwA was invited by Minister for Justice and equality on 27th October to an online event on the pre-launch of victim support project which aims to deliver training, raise awareness on rights and services and support available for women victim of sexual violence. There will also be a review of laws and policies and funding for groups supporting women.

This project is part of recommendations from Tom O'Malley Implementation Group Report which not only seeks to introduce new supports but also strengthen existing ones for vulnerable victims and witnesses in the criminal justice system.



Language and civic test proposed for Irish Citizenship

AkiDwA attended meeting with the DJE in September on the launch of report by ESRI on applying on language and civic test in the application of citizenship.

Gender and racism Conference held

On 21st October, AkiDwA, NWCi and National Travellers women forum held a conference on Gender and racism, discussions focused on the intersectionality of migration, gender and racism. Various speakers from the three organisations spoke during the conference including Oluchi Porter and Salome Mbugua.

The conference heard the challenges facing women in direct provision which include racism and sexism, difficult in parenting and access to services and resources.



FGM Review

AkiDwA is collaboratively working with End FGM network (from Belgium) in mapping FGM in Europe, Caroline Munyi, Migrant Women's Health Coordinator is putting information on Ireland together. AkiDwA has commissioned a consultant to undertake a comprehensive review and evaluation on FGM work in Ireland in the last five years. The outcome of this review is hoped to help with lobbying and campaign, and more so for a government led National Action Plan (NAP).

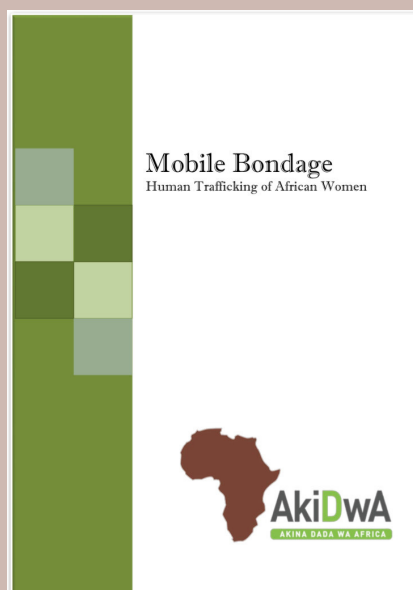


AkiDwA report on trafficking of migrant women Launched

AkiDwA launched findings of the research on trafficking of migrant women in November. The research which mainly focused on trafficking of African women in Ireland shows victims from the African continent often come from vulnerable situations and are under peculiar circumstances which require a context specific approach to be applied in the prevention and protection of victims. Prosecution of traffickers and implementation of effective laws and policies must be applied. Additionally country of origin and destination must work together to address the root cause of the problem.

The report makes valid suggestions and recommendations which include the establishment of gender-specific accommodation for the victims of human trafficking. The provision of statutory definition of reasonable grounds for suspicion that a person is a victim of human trafficking needs as well as the burden of proof necessary to determine victimhood.

The codification of the current practice guideline that currently provide for the national referral mechanism and the victim support structure. The establishment of a state fund for victim of trafficking compensation. Copy of this research can be found on our website www.akidwa.ie



Women Together for a better world project

Implementation of AkiDwA project on Women together for a better world whose aim is to bring migrant and indigenous women together to articulate ways to achieve a better and equal world has progressed well in the last few months.

Mapping of organisations working with communities in county Clare and Donegal was undertaken and most of the organisations responded positively to the project. Meeting was held with Clare Women's Network in September.

Training session for the project has been produced after several meetings with women from Clare Women's Network. The project is funded by Department of Foreign Affairs, Development Education Unit.

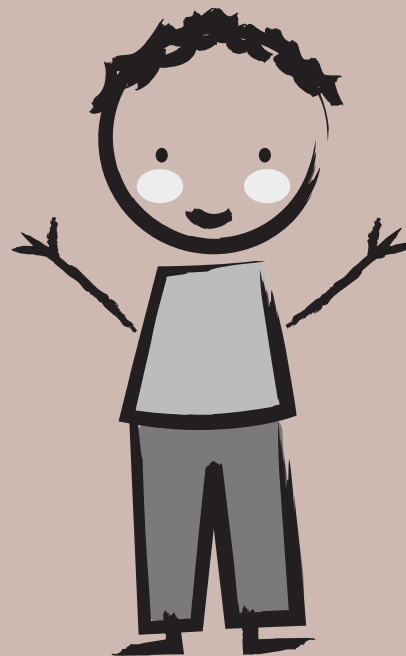

Migrant Information Day

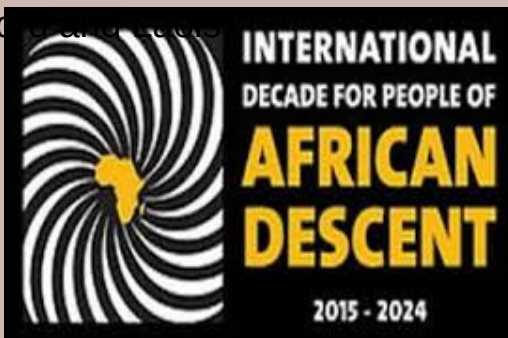
On 23rd September 2020, AkiDwA in collaboration with IOM held an information day at Wynn's hotel. Various organisations were invited to provide information on the day. These include, Dublin Therapy Centre, IOM, Dublin City Community Coop. The event was very successful despite restrictions imposed on social gatherings.

35 people from different backgrounds/nationalities, including Latino- Americans, Africans, Indians, Australians and Americans participated in the event. Financial support for the event was provided by IOM.



Implementation of IDPAD- Ireland

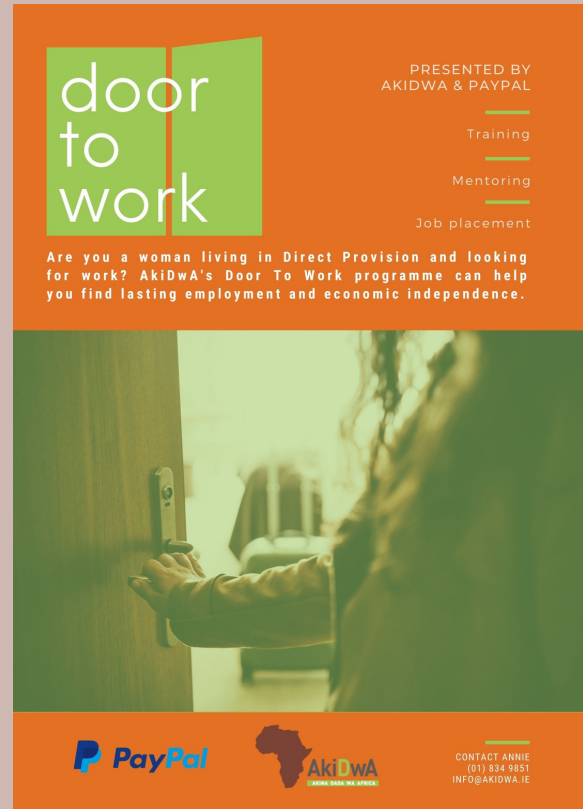
In support of the implementation of the International decade for People of African descent, Salome Mbugua helped in mobilising African organisations and groups in five counties, Cork, Limerick, Galway, Waterford and Wick.



Five regional meetings were held with over 100 African community in these counties participating. Discussions focused on the three-key objective of the decade which are recognition, justice and equality. The project is funded by Department of Justice and Equality and has a project worker. AkiDwA host the funding on behalf of the IDPAD – Ireland steering committee.

AkiDwA employment and entrepreneurship project with PayPal

With support from PayPal, AkiDwA has developed two projects-Door to work project which aims to provide training on access to labour market, mentoring and job shadowing and In from the margin which is a project which will support women with low literacy levels and interested in establishing entrepreneurship projects



Collaboration with Abbey Theatre

AkiDwA worked with Abbey theatre in a project called Dear Ireland, where Abbey Theatre produced a series and was broadcasted to the nation, and to the world in December through their social media outlet.

Sexual and gender-based violence Conference

On 26th November 2020 AkiDwA held a conference on Sexual and Gender-Based Violence: migrant women's perspective. 469 people registered for the conference and over 600 participated through zoom, Facebook and YouTube. In this conference we marked the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Based Violence. The conference covered trafficking but also the incidence of forced marriage and honour violence in some cultures (a form of domestic violence) and highlighted AkiDwA role in supporting migrant women survivors of violence and abuse. The organisation report on the outcome of the research on trafficking was shared during the conference. We had speakers and experts from different backgrounds from Ireland and UK.

This includes Siobhan Mullally UN special Rapporteur on Trafficking, among other speakers. AkiDwA will explore issues of forced marriage through research in 2021. On the same note, it was revealed that AkiDwA attends to at least 900 cases of gender-based annually. This is made possible through the organisations work with it's network of Community Health Ambassadors (CHAs).

Community Health Ambassador

During the lockdown, Rodrigue has been connecting with the community online. Among the issues which have overwhelmed Rodrigue are mental health and gender based violence among migrant communities in Cork and the surrounding areas.

According to Rodrigue 'the issue of mental health in particular need to be addressed because it spiked during the lockdown. This is because migrants, especially women in the Direct Provision centres have particular vulnerabilities which are unique to their situation and not common in the rest of the population'. These vulnerabilities are compounded by children especially for those women with small children in the DPs'.

Rodrigue advises that there is need to factor these group separately so that their unique needs can be catered for.

AkiDwA's Men's Health Project a Building Bridges initiative

Over the last two years AkiDwA has been running the Men's Reproductive Health project which is supported and funded by the HSE. This project mainly targets men in Direct Provision centres.

In this period, 3600 condoms and information leaflets were distributed to men in 15 accommodation centres

by Stephen who has been working with men in various centres in Ireland.



Young Migrant Youth Summit

The Young Migrant Women Youth Summit was held on 8th November 2020 and had over 30 young people in attendance. The aim of the Youth summit was to bring young African Caribbean Migrant Men and women together to rub minds together but also empower and inspire each other. There was a need to bring young people together to help them integrate into the Irish Western Community. The summit was instrumental in deepening our appreciation of our values, cultural diversity, and unique contribution to the community. It brought together communities and organisations around our common issues of diversity and inclusion. The planning of the event was done by both the Young Migrant women's Network (AkiDwa) and Afroin Diaspora Centre (AdCenter).

The event was graced by Salome Mbugua, CEO of AkiDwa who was also a key note speaker.

Phase one speakers were Susanna Olatunji Komolafe (Keynote speaker from adCenter), Nana Ornella and Nengi Benstowe the Young Migrant women's group coordinator.

There were 8 speakers in total: six from within both hosting organisations and two externals.

The speakers addressed the below topic:

1) Where can people get support on common issues affecting migrants in Ireland?

2) How are people meant to react to common issues people throw at them e.g racist slurs etc

The feedback at the end of the event were all positive and attendees felt very well informed on all key areas discussed.

AkiDwA Annual General Assembly 2020

AkiDwA Annual General Meeting was held on 5th December with many of our members attending though zoom. Discussions on domestic violence were held since this was a key issue of concern affecting our members in 2020. AkiDwA presented a summary of our work and future plans for domestic violence activism among women in Direct Provision. We also had a presentation from Sarah Benson, CEO of Women's Aid, providing information on Women's Aid data gathered throughout the pandemic, support

they provide to migrant women, and an overview of understanding domestic violence.

AkiDwA Planning for 2021- 20th Anniversary

Staff and board met to discuss planning for 2021 which is a significant year for AkiDwA. The staff met on 11th December and board on 18th December. The views and input of members collected during the AGM on 5th December will be incorporated in the plan for 2021.
